Dear Parents

ATTENDANCE MATTERS: Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day. We realize some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances. However, we also know that when students miss too much school - regardless of the reason - it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your child is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent - which is defined as missing 18 or more days over

the course of an entire school year. Research shows that starting in kindergarten, too many absences (excused and unexcused) can cause children to fall behind in school; missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) increases the chance that your student will not read or master math at the same level as their peers; students can fall behind if they miss just a day or two every few weeks; being late to school may lead to poor attendance; and absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up. Let us know how we can support you and your child.

Attendance Procedures

Maine law requires daily attendance of all students ages 7-17. Personal illness, health related appointments, religious holidays, family emergencies, and specific planned purposes are considered excusable absences provided that the parents call the school or provide written documentation. Unexcused absences will result in a student being classified as truant. Truancy at the elementary level has to

be reported to the Superintendent of Schools and the Maine Department of Education and is defined as follow; “when a student is at least 7 years of age and has not completed grade 6 and has the equivalent of 7 full days of unexcused absences or 5 consecutive school days of unexcused absences during a school year. Please help keep our attendance records accurate by contacting the school when your child is absent.

Nutrition/Wellness Expectations

RSU 18 has a Wellness Policy that is committed to providing a school environment that supports student wellness, healthy food choices, nutrition education, and regular physical activity. A goal at BCS is to make sure that all students receive a consistent nutrition message throughout the school, including classrooms, cafeteria, and school-home communications. In order to meet this goal of consistency, students should be reminded that when food is provided to

other students at parties, celebrations, meetings or just to classmates for no particular reason, choices should include items that are whole grain rich, or have a fruit or vegetable as the primary ingredient. Providing donuts without other nutritional options first thing in the morning to classmates is not supporting our nutritional message. Please refrain from sending in these items so that our message remains consistent. Additionally, beverages high in sugar and caffeine (soda and coffee) should not be brought to school.

Appropriate Dress for Spring Weather

As warm weather is quickly approaching we would ask that you remind your student(s) about proper dress for school. All students are expected to dress appropriately for a K-5 educational environment. Any clothing that interferes with or disrupts the educational environment is unacceptable and students will be required to cover the inappropriate clothing or may be sent home to change

such clothing. Shoes should be worn at all times as flip-flops or sandals may limit certain activities because of safety reasons. Skirts, shorts, and dresses should be mid-thigh or longer in length (finger-tip rule). Immodest clothing is prohibited at school (bare midriffs, undergarments exposed). We ask parents to see that their children are dressed and groomed properly to encourage cleanliness and good health.

As another year comes to an End

Each year our school calendar includes snow days. This year, at BCS we had a total of six snow days with only four being included in our calendar. As a result of these additional days, our last day of school for students and teachers will change. The last day for students

will now be June 21st with a dismissal at noon. The last day for teachers will be on June 22nd, which is an in-service day.
